HEALTH & SAFETY - OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH & SAFETY

POLICY

Co-ordination Unit staff are employed by the sponsoring body to monitor the health and safety standards of Educator homes during official hours of operation of Family Day Care.

This policy should be read in conjunction with the Resource Unit's Infection Control and Hygiene Policy.

PURPOSE

- 1. To take all reasonable precautions to provide and maintain, so far as is practicable, a Family Day Care home environment that is safe and without risks to health for Educators, children and parents during the hours of operation of Family Day Care.
- 2. To ensure that the responsibility for safety and health at the Family Day Care home, during hours of operation of Family Day Care, is the mutual goal of the Co-ordination Unit and Educators.

PROCEDURE

Safety is the concern of everyone

1. The Family Day Care Co-ordination Unit will:

- Take all reasonable steps to ensure that all equipment meets the relevant Australian Safety Standards.
- Safety check all Educator homes before registration. Formal safety checks will be carried out annually.
- Provide Educators with safe, clean equipment. Maintenance and cleanliness of equipment is the responsibility of the Educator using it. The Scheme takes responsibility for maintenance and ensuring cleanliness upon return of the equipment or before distribution of equipment.
- Promote workplace health & safety by education, information and instruction.
- Ensure that Educators maintain a high level of awareness of health and safety issues.
- Encourage each Educator to regard accident prevention as an individual responsibility.
- Foster a working environment which encourages Educators to report difficulties.
- Require that every accident is reported, and where appropriate investigated, and ensure any action necessary to reduce further safety and health risks.

2. Educators:

- Will take all the care of which they are capable for their own health and that of other people who may be affected by their conduct during the operation of Family Day Care.
- Must not wilfully or recklessly interfere with or misuse anything provided in the interests of health and safety or welfare.
- Must not wilfully place at risk the health or safety of any person involved in the Family Day Care program.
- Will be responsible for adopting safe work practices.
- Will diligently exercise their responsibility for control of working conditions, practices and workload.
- Will be alert for safety and health risks in the Family Day Care home and report these to Coordination Unit staff.
- Will observe all safety instructions, act safely avoid unnecessary risk.
- Will maintain a clean, tidy and safe home during the operation of Family Day Care.
